

True Prosperity

Summary:

*True prosperity is not defined by material wealth but by relational wholeness with God. Many believers have been conditioned to pursue God through a transactional lens—doing to get. However, under the new covenant, prosperity flows from a relational relationship rooted in trust, love, and alignment with the finished work of Jesus. Prosperity is not about what you have, but **who** you have. It is about wholeness—peace, purpose, identity, health, and provision—all flowing from intimacy with God, not from performance.*

Notes:

1. A transactional relationship is based on performance: “If I do this, God will do that.”
A relational relationship is based on trust and love: “Even if God does nothing else, I’m in it for the relationship.”
2. Joseph, though a slave with no possessions, was called prosperous because “the Lord was with him.” His master recognized God’s presence in him, which led to success in all he did.
3. Like righteousness and healing, prosperity is already finished through Jesus. We don’t sow to become prosperous but instead give from a place of trust in what is already done.
4. When life feels off, it’s not about striving, but about realigning with what has already been finished. Laboring in the Word, worship, and trust helps restore alignment.
5. Prosperity equals wholeness in finances, health, peace, purpose, identity, joy, security, and relationships. True prosperity is “nothing missing, nothing broken.”
6. Many pursue material success without a relationship with God, mistaking mammon-driven gain for divine prosperity. Prosperity without peace, purpose, or love is incomplete and deceptive.
